

Today's gospel instructs us how to handle the cross that comes with life. Jesus indicates that the way to become his disciples involves forgetting self, carrying the cross and following him. He encourages us to have the determination and strength to pick up the cross and follow Him and His way; the way of love. The problem with many of us is when we realize the enormous challenges before us, we do not pick up the cross. We pick up our slippers and start racing away. We are used to so much comfort or learned to be indifferent, that we dread resolving life's trials.

Jesus took our sufferings on Himself because of His unconditional love for us. He is willing to sacrifice for our sakes, for our salvation. He embraced the cross, carried the cross and even died on the cross just to show how much He loves us all. Indeed, this is not the standard of men, for human reaction is to choose a comfortable and easy life. Man's standards say, "Be comfortable, seek security, enjoy life." Yes, who among us doesn't want a comfortable, enjoyable, and secure life? That is also the reason, when there are problems to be solved, be it in family, school, workplace or community, that many people would rather flee, keep quiet, seek liquor or even drugs, hang out all night with friends, rather than courageously face one's issues, one's cross.

However, the reality of life is not just a bed of roses. The reality of life is that among the roses there are also thorns and we have to deal and face these thorns – our problems, challenges, and trials in life. It does not mean that you just accept your fate and don't do anything about it. If medical experts, for instance, can remedy or lessen suffering, like the discovery of medicines that will cure advanced cancer or HIV, that would be a great contribution to humanity. If the front liners risk their lives to treat COVID-19 patients and seek for a cure of this virus, then we also have to do our part not to spread the virus and pray that this pandemic will soon end.

But if suffering is inevitable and beyond human control, the Christian attitude is that we offer it to God, uniting it with the sufferings of Christ so it becomes meritorious and not wasted. In the words of St. Paul: "If you suffer with Christ, you will also rise with Him."

Jesus now points out to us that the cross is not a sign of pain and suffering anymore, but a symbol of hope and love. When we carry our cross, we deny our self and follow Him. Let us remember that He bore the cross on his shoulders and was nailed to it, all because of love. He gives us hope that beyond all suffering there is resurrection, there is new life. We need to take up the cross for it is the only way that we can follow our Lord. We all want to follow our Lord Jesus. We have to also bear our cross like Him, and at the end, experience the everlasting joy in following Him.

El Evangelio de hoy nos instruye en la forma de manejar la cruz que viene con la vida. Jesús indica que la manera de convertirse en sus discípulos pasa por olvidarse de sí mismo, a cargar con la cruz y seguirlo. Nos anima a tener la determinación y la fuerza para tomar la cruz y seguirle, su camino, el camino del amor. El problema con muchos de nosotros es que cuando nos damos cuenta de la enormidad de los desafíos que tenemos ante nosotros, no tomamos la cruz. Recogemos nuestras zapatillas y empezamos a correr. Estamos acostumbrados a tanto consuelo o hemos aprendido a ser indiferentes, que tememos resolver las pruebas de la vida.

Jesús tomó nuestros sufrimientos en sí mismo debido a su amor incondicional por nosotros. Está dispuesto a sacrificarse por nosotros, por nuestra salvación. Él abrazó la cruz, cargó la cruz e incluso murió en la cruz solo para mostrarnos cuánto nos ama a todos. De hecho, estos no son los estándares del hombre, porque la reacción humana es elegir una vida cómoda y fácil. Los estándares del hombre dicen: "Siéntete cómodo; busca seguridad; disfruta la vida." Sí, ¿quién de nosotros no quiere una vida cómoda, agradable y segura? Esa es también la razón cuando hay problemas que resolver, ya sea en la familia, la escuela, el lugar de trabajo o la comunidad, que muchas personas prefieren huir, callar, buscar licor o incluso drogas, pasar toda la noche con amigos, en lugar de eso. que afrontar valientemente los problemas de uno, la cruz de uno.

Sin embargo, la realidad de la vida no es solo un lecho de rosas. La realidad de la vida es que entre las rosas también hay espinas y tenemos que lidiar y enfrentar estas espinas, nuestros problemas, desafíos y pruebas en la vida. No significa que simplemente aceptes tu destino y no hagas nada al respecto. Si los expertos médicos, por ejemplo, pueden remediar o aliviar el sufrimiento, como el descubrimiento de medicamentos que curarán el cáncer avanzado o el HIV, entonces será una gran contribución a la humanidad. Si los de primera línea arriesgan sus vidas para tratar a los pacientes con COVID-19 y buscan la cura de este virus que causó la pandemia, entonces también tenemos que hacer nuestra parte para no propagar el virus y rezar para que esta pandemia termine pronto.

Pero si el sufrimiento es inevitable y está más allá del control humano, la actitud Cristiana es que se lo ofrezcamos a Dios, uniéndolo con los sufrimientos de Cristo para que se vuelva meritorio y no en vano. En palabras de San Pablo:

Si sufres con Cristo, también resucitarás con Él.

Jesús ahora nos señala que la cruz ya no es una señal de dolor y sufrimiento, sino un símbolo de esperanza y amor cuando cargamos nuestra cruz, nos negamos a nosotros mismos y lo seguimos. Recordemos que Él llevó la cruz sobre sus hombros y fue clavado en todo por amor y para darnos esa esperanza de que más allá de todo sufrimiento hay resurrección, hay vida nueva. Necesitamos tomar la cruz porque es la única forma en que podemos seguir a nuestro Señor. Todos queremos seguir a nuestro Señor Jesús y por eso también tenemos que llevar nuestra cruz como Él y al final experimentar el gozo eterno de seguirlo.
