We are living in a very health conscious society. It is almost impossible these days to go an entire day without hearing something about health. Turn your TV on, and no matter what you watch, there will be a commercial about some product that is good for you. Yes, we are living in a very health conscious culture. But sadly, not many people care to have a healthy soul.

The Gospel of this 1st Sunday of Lent calls us to repent “*Repent, and believe in the gospel*” (Mk1:15). Repentance is not just sitting there crying out for our sins, but to change. Change the way we live, the way we think and the way we look at things. The liturgy today brings us out into the desert to meet with Jesus. What’s in the desert? Nothing: no cellphones, no internet, no TV, no distractions. While staying in the desert you will ask yourselves these basic questions: Who I am? What am I here on earth for? And where I am going from here? These questions help us know who we really are and how to improve our conditions.

In the desert, we feel ourselves identified with our Lord who was subjected to temptations. Out of his love, the Lord let himself be tempted to show his solidarity with us. He went to the desert to meet us and to bring us back. And just as the angels ministered to Jesus in this desert, so also does He send those angels to minister to us.

So whether your “desert” is only a slight agitation in life right now, or if it’s a struggle against complete despair, Jesus wants to meet you and bring you out. He conquered the desert once and for all and He is able to conquer any desert in your life also.

Lord, we believe that you love us enough to endure all suffering, to understand all suffering. May we let you be driven into the desert of our soul and there, as we encounter you, may we allow you to lead us to the cool and refreshing waters. Amen!

Feliz Cuaresma

Vivimos en una sociedad muy consciente de la salud. Es casi imposible en estos días pasar un día entero sin escuchar algo sobre salud. Enciende tu televisor y no importa lo que mires, habrá un comercial sobre algún producto que es bueno para ti. Sí, vivimos en una cultura de conciencia de la salud. Pero, lamentablemente, no muchas personas se preocupan por tener un alma sana.

El Evangelio de este primer Domingo de Cuaresma nos llama al arrepentimiento *"Arrepentíos y creed en el evangelio"* (Mc 1,15). Arrepentirse no es simplemente sentarse allí clamando por nuestros pecados, sino también para cambiar. Cambiar la forma en que vivimos, la forma en que pensamos y la forma en que miramos las cosas. La liturgia de hoy nos lleva al desierto para encontrarnos con Jesús. ¿Qué hay en el desierto? Nada: sin teléfonos celulares, sin internet, sin televisión, sin distracciones. Mientras permanezcas en el desierto te harás estas preguntas básicas: ¿Quién soy? ¿Para qué estoy aquí en la tierra? ¿Y a dónde voy desde aquí? Estas preguntas nos ayudan a saber quiénes somos realmente y cómo mejoramos nuestras condiciones.

En el desierto, nos sentimos identificados con nuestro Señor que fue sometido a las tentaciones. Por su amor, el Señor se dejó tentar para mostrar su solidaridad con nosotros. Se fue al desierto para encontrarnos y traernos de regreso. Y así como los ángeles ministraron a Jesús en este desierto, también Él envía a esos ángeles para ministrarnos.

Entonces, ya sea que su "desierto" sea solo una leve agitación en la vida en este momento, o si es una lucha contra la completa desesperación, Jesús quiere encontrarse contigo y sacarte de ahí. Él conquistó el desierto de una vez por todas y también es capaz de conquistar cualquier desierto en tu vida.

Señor, creemos que nos amas lo suficiente como para soportar todo sufrimiento, para comprender todo sufrimiento. Que te dejemos llevarnos al desierto de nuestra alma y allí, cuando te encontremos, te permitamos conducirnos a las frescas y refrescantes aguas. ¡Amén!

WELCOME TO LENT!

You probably did not get that greeting from your priest today, and you probably did not expect it. Isn't Lent a time of reflection and repentance? Somber purple, no "Alleluias"? Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving; attending to one's relationship with God?

True enough; however, there are Lenten practices that have a festive air woven into these penitential elements. One example is in the Church's retrieval of ancient Lenten practices that made up the final preparation of persons elected to receive the Easter sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and eucharist. Jesus' urgent preaching in today's passage from Mark comes soon after his own baptism and reminds us that these sacraments still signal a dramatic change in a person's life: they have responded to Jesus' preaching of the kingdom and are now publicly professing themselves to be disciples of the Lord and fully initiated members of his visible church. The prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent were part of that preparation. Repentance was then, and remains today, important also for those already fully initiated; the work of repentance, of prayerfully examining our lives and making changes in anticipation of God's reign, is an ongoing aspect of our life in Christ.

LENTEN FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Lenten Fasting and Abstinence Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of universal fast and abstinence. Fasting is obligatory for all who have completed their 18th year until the beginning of their 60th year. Fasting allows a person to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may be taken, not to equal one full meal. Abstinence (from meat) is obligatory for all who have completed their 14th year of age. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare to share more fully and celebrate more readily his Resurrection. Fridays in Lent are obligatory days of abstinence (from meat) for all who have completed their 14th year. As always, anyone for whom fasting or abstinence would pose a health risk is excused.

Bishop Robert Barron's series on the Eucharist for Lenten Spiritual Renewal

SATAN RECOGNIZES CHRIST'S BODY. DO WE? Join us for Bishop Robert Barron's series on the Eucharist.

In the early Church, 2,000 years ago the common understanding among all Catholics was that Christ is actually, truly present under the appearance of bread and wine. If one did not believe that you could not be a member of the Church. A few years ago a Pew Research survey reported that 69% of Catholics believe the Eucharist is only symbolic. What happened? A lack of good catechesis is one likely answer. Bishop Barron has published a study series on the Eucharist that brings history and Church teaching together to teach what Jesus taught – that on the night before he was crucified he took break, broke it, saying “this is my body...” and that He literally meant it. Join us for this 8 session series where we will learn from history, the early Church Fathers what Jesus and his Church taught about the Eucharist and how and why it is our spiritual food for the journey. Meetings will be held via Zoom by facilitators who will lead us through a very fascinating, and even fun topic as we explore and recapture what the Church has always taught about the Eucharist. **The first meeting will be held Thursday February 18, the day after Ash Wednesday at 7 pm.**
