



Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

St. John describes God's love for us with a famous quote from Jesus, "*God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.*" This fourth Sunday of Lent is called Laetare Sunday. "Laetare" in Latin means, "Rejoice!" In the middle of the serious season of Lent, the Church invites us to rejoice as the Entrance Antiphon says: "*Rejoice, Jerusalem! Be glad for her, you who love her; rejoice with her, you who mourned for her.*" God is love; and His love never changes. We, human beings, are subjected to change; but God never changes. He is love.

From eternity, God the Father and Son love each other so much that it overflows into the world. We are created in that love. We fall into sin. But God keeps on loving us by sending his only Son to die and to atone for our sins. God's love for us is always unconditional. "*What good is it if you only greet those who greet you; if you only love those who love you? Don't sinners do the same? So love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you*" (Luke 6:32-33). Unconditional love is to love all.


Is it possible for a rose to say I will give my perfume to good people and withhold it from bad people? The rose, by its very nature, cannot but love all. Is it possible for a candle to say I will give my light to good people in this church and withhold it from the bad? Is it possible for a tree to say I will give my shade to good people, but hide it from the bad? It cannot. The tree will give shade even to the man who is cutting it down. Love so enjoys the loving that it is unaware of itself.

Like the tree, the rose, and the candle, love gives and expects nothing in return. This kind of love is called Agape in Greek. Agape is a total self-giving love. It does not pick and choose. It loves all and gives all. Agape begins with God the Father in his act of creation. It continues with Jesus who gave us his all. His self-giving act sets up a model of love for us, delivering us from the bondage of law. He transforms law into love, for only love will set us free.

"A bell is no bell until it is rung. A song is no song until it is sung." And a Christian is no Christian until he or she shows love. By this love will everyone know that we are His disciples. When we say we love God, we sacrifice our time, our work to be with him, to serve him. When we say we love our neighbors, we sacrifice our ego, our pride to forgive. Sacrifice is another word for love, for there is no love without sacrifice. Sacrifice itself is love in action.

This is an example of how we show Christian love in concrete practice that I found on the Internet: "*in the home it is kindness, in business it is honesty, in society it is courtesy, in work it is fairness. Toward the unfortunate it is pity; toward the weak it is help; toward the wicked it is resistance; toward the strong it is trust; toward the fortunate it is congratulations, toward the penitent it is forgiveness, toward God it is reverence and love.*" To love is nothing, to be loved is something but to love and to be loved by the one you love, that is everything.

Hermanos y Hermanas en Cristo,

San Juan describe el amor de Dios por nosotros con una cita famosa de Jesús: "*Tanto amó Dios al mundo que dio a su Hijo único, para que todo el que crea en él no perezca, sino que tenga vida eterna*". Este cuarto Domingo de Cuaresma se llama Domingo de Laetare. "Laetare" en latín significa, "¡regocijate!" En medio del serio tiempo de Cuaresma, la Iglesia nos invita a regocijarnos como dice la Antífona de Entrada: "¡Alégrate, Jerusalén! Alégrate por ella, los que la aman; alégrate con ella, que la lloraste". Dios es amor, y su amor nunca cambia. Nosotros, los seres humanos, estamos sujetos a cambios, pero Dios nunca cambia. Él es amor.

Desde la eternidad, Dios Padre e Hijo se aman tanto que se desborda en el mundo. Somos creados en ese amor. Caemos en pecados. Pero Dios sigue amándonos al enviar a su único Hijo a morir y expiar nuestros pecados. El amor de Dios por nosotros es siempre incondicional. "*¿De qué sirve si sólo saludas a los que le saludan; si solo amas a los que te aman? ¿No hacen lo mismo los pecadores? Por tanto, ama a tus enemigos y ora por los que te persiguen*" (Lucas 6: 32-33). El amor incondicional es amar a todos.

Es posible que una rosa diga que le daré mi perfume a la gente buena y se lo negaré a la gente mala? La rosa, por su propia naturaleza, no puede dejar de amar a todos. ¿Es posible que una vela diga que daré mi luz a la gente buena en esta iglesia y se la negaré a los malos? ¿Es posible que un árbol diga que daré mi sombra a la gente buena, pero que la esconda de la mala? No puede. El árbol dará sombra incluso al hombre que lo corta. El amor disfruta tanto del amor que no se da cuenta de sí mismo.

Como el árbol, la rosa y la vela, el amor no da y no espera nada a cambio. Este tipo de amor se llama Ágape en griego. Ágape es un amor total y abnegado. No escoge y elige. Ama todo y lo da todo. Agape comienza con Dios Padre en su acto de creación. Continúa con Jesús que nos dio todo. Su acto de entrega establece un modelo de amor para nosotros, liberándonos de la esclavitud de la ley. Él transforma la ley en amor, porque solo el amor nos hará libres.

Una campana no es campana hasta que se toca. Una canción no es canción hasta que se canta ". Y un Cristiano no es Cristiano hasta que muestra amor. Por este amor todos sabrán que somos sus discípulos. Cuando decimos que amamos a Dios, sacrificamos nuestro tiempo, nuestro trabajo para estar con él, para servirle. Cuando decimos que amamos a nuestro prójimo, sacrificamos nuestro ego, nuestro orgullo para perdonar. El sacrificio es otra palabra para el amor, porque no hay amor sin sacrificio. El sacrificio mismo es amor en acción.

Así es como mostramos el amor Cristiano en la práctica concreta que encontré en Internet: "*en el hogar es la bondad, en los negocios es la honestidad, en la sociedad es la cortesía, en el trabajo es la justicia. Para los desdichados es lástima; para los débiles es ayuda; para los malvados es resistencia; hacia el fuerte es confianza; para el afortunado es felicitaciones, para el penitente es perdón, para Dios es reverencia y amor*". Amar no es nada, ser amado es algo más que amar y ser amado por el que amas, eso es todo.



La Eucaristía: Renovación Espiritual en la Cuaresma. Obispo Robert Barron

En la Iglesia primitiva, los católicos creían certamente que Cristo estaba realmente presente bajo las especies del pan y del vino. Si una persona no creía esto, no podía ser miembro de la Iglesia. Hace unos años, una investigación de "Pew" informó que el 69% de los católicos cree que la Eucaristía es sólo simbólica. ¿Qué ha pasado? La falta de buena catequesis es una respuesta probable.

El Obispo Barron ha publicado una serie de estudios sobre la Eucaristía que reúne la historia y la enseñanza de la Iglesia para enseñar lo que Jesús enseñó: **que la noche antes de ser crucificado, tomó pan, lo rompió, diciendo "este es mi cuerpo..."** y que Jesús literalmente quiso decir eso.

Únase a nosotros para ver esta serie de videos de 4 sesiones donde miraremos la historia, y aprenderemos de lo que los primeros Padres de la Iglesia entendían lo que era la Eucaristía, y cómo y por qué es nuestro alimento espiritual.
