Palm Sunday

Today begins the great liturgical week that leads us to Easter, the death and resurrection of the Lord, the center of our Christian faith. Holy Week, then, is a time of deep religious experiences; the mystery of God "delivered by us" and the strength of his resurrection, as St Paul expressed himself, summoning us to the cross which is the triumph of love over hatred, hope in the face of all despair.

The gospel of the entry into Jerusalem, with the procession of the community and bouquets of palms, must serve to inaugurate the great week of Christianity. All the "tradition" and beauty of bouquets and palms, however, invites us to enter that experience of going to Jerusalem that the prophet of Galilee could not escape. Jesus certainly knew what awaited him: judgment, condemnation, and death.

All of that we have dramatized beautifully many times, but around Easter of the year 30 there was nothing theatrical, but the harsh reality of "someone" who knows what he wants. Jesus is not under any illusions about the cries of "Hosanna," because he did not feel like a Messiah, let alone as some interpreted him. These acclamations would further justify his judgment and condemnation to the powerful who were waiting for Galilee's prophet to arrive in Jerusalem. And He came...

What makes us Christians is following Jesus. Nothing else. This following of Jesus is not a theoretical or abstract thing. Following Jesus is an exciting task: it is difficult to imagine a more dignified and noble life. But it comes at a price. To follow Jesus, it is important to "do": to make a world more just and more humane; make a Church more faithful to Jesus and more consistent with the Gospel. However, it is also important to "suffer": suffering for a more dignified world; suffering for a more evangelical Church.

Following Jesus thus brings, sooner or later, conflicts, problems, and suffering. We must be willing to bear the reactions and resistances of those who, for one reason or another, do not seek a more humane world, just as what God revealed in Jesus.

The Gospels have retained a realistic call from Jesus to his followers. The scandalous image can only come from Him: "If anyone wants to come after me, carry your cross on your back and follow me." Jesus does not trick them. If we really follow him, we will have to share his destiny. We will end up like Him. That will be the best proof that you're a faithful follower.

In this Holy Week, may God lead us to make a change in our lives, walking with Jesus to make a more just and humane world.

Domingo de Ramos

Hoy comienza la gran semana litúrgica que nos conduce a la Pascua, la muerte y resurrección del Señor, centro de nuestra fe cristiana. La Semana Santa, pues, es un tiempo de profundas vivencias religiosas; el misterio del Dios “entregado por nosotros” y la fuerza de su resurrección, como se expresaba San Pablo, nos convocan ante la Cruz que es el triunfo del amor sobre el odio, la esperanza frente a toda desesperación.

El evangelio de la entrada en Jerusalén, con la procesión de la comunidad y los ramos, debe servir para inaugurar la gran semana del cristianismo. Toda la “tradicón” y hermosura de los ramos y palmas, no obstante, nos invita a introducirnos en aquella experiencia de ir a Jerusalén que el profeta de Galilea no podía eludir. Jesús, sin duda, ya sabía lo que le esperaba: el juicio, la condena y la muerte.

Todo eso lo hemos dramatizado hermosamente muchas veces, pero en torno a aquella Pascua del año 30 no había nada teatral, sino la dura realidad de “alguien” que sabe lo que quiere. Jesús no se deja ilusionar por los gritos de “Hosanna”, porque no se sentía Mesías, y menos como algunos lo interpretaron. Estas aclamaciones justificarían más su juicio y su condena ante los poderosos que estaban esperando que llegara el profeta de Galilea a Jerusalén. Y llegó...

Lo que nos hace cristianos es seguir a Jesús. Nada más. Este seguimiento a Jesús no es algo teórico o abstracto. Seguir a Jesús es una tarea apasionante: es difícil imaginar una vida más digna y noble. Pero tiene un precio. Para seguir a Jesús, es importante “hacer”: hacer un mundo más justo y más humano; hacer una Iglesia más fiel a Jesús y más coherente con el evangelio. Sin embargo, es tan importante o más “padecer”: padecer por un mundo más digno; padecer por una Iglesia más evangélica.

Seguir así a Jesús trae consigo, más tarde o más temprano, conflictos, problemas y sufrimiento. Hay que estar dispuesto a cargar con las reacciones y resistencias de quienes, por una razón u otra, no buscan un mundo más humano, tal como lo quiere ese Dios revelado en Jesús.

Los evangelios han conservado una llamada realista de Jesús a sus seguidores. Lo escandaloso de la imagen sólo puede provenir de Él: “Si alguno quiere venir detrás de mí... cargue sobre la espalda su cruz y sígame”. Jesús no los engaña. Si le seguimos de verdad, tendremos que compartir su destino. Terminaremos como Él. Esa será la mejor prueba de que su seguimiento es fiel.

Que está Semana Santa nos lleve a hacer un cambio en nuestra vida, caminando con Jesús para hacer un mundo más justo y humano.

12 ways to make Holy Week more meaningful

1. **THINK PRAYER.** If you have to work or go to school during Holy Week, think about how you can incorporate prayer breaks into each day.
2. **MAKE AN ADDITIONAL SACRIFICE** by fasting and abstaining from meat on Holy Thursday and Holy Saturday in addition to Good Friday.
3. **DON'T WATCH TELEVISION** from sundown on Holy Thursday until Easter morning.
4. **GO** to confession.
5. **SET ASIDE** 10 minutes every day to read Passion accounts in the Gospels.
6. Make it a point to **FORGIVE** someone on Good Friday.
7. **PRAY** the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary.
8. **OFFER UP** any pain or difficulties you experience during Holy Week and unite your sufferings with the pain of Christ.
9. **PRAY** the Stations of the Cross.
10. **ATTEND** all of the Triduum liturgies.
11. **INVITE** family members, friends and neighbors — especially people who have strayed from the church — to come to church with you.
12. **VOLUNTEER** to help decorate your parish on Holy Saturday for Easter.

May we who settle in for a quarantine at home remember those who have no home.

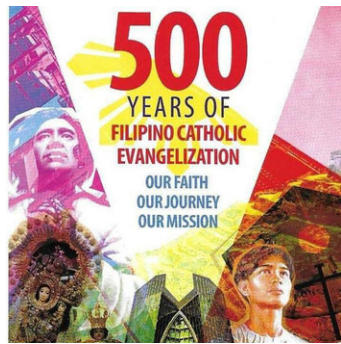
As fear grips our country, let us choose love.
