

11th Sunday Ordinary Time Year B

My dear friends, I share with you this reflection taken from ePriest.com sources.

Today's readings remind us that the Kingdom of God has already been sown by Our Lord and continues to grow with us or without us, because it grows due God's power, just like nature does. It can grow in and through us too if we cultivate it in our hearts.

In today's First Reading, Ezekiel describes the Messiah as a tender shoot taken off the main tree—the royal stock of David. The Messiah will be established on the heights but will also grow to be tall and be sheltering for all those who can reach those heights. Other kings and their lines will look upon the Messiah's prosperity and realize that it is the Lord who blesses them or lets their lineage fade away, fruitless. Many "birds" will find shelter in this tree, but they must fly very high.

In today's Second Reading, Paul reminds us that the way we use this dying mortal body will determine what it grows into in eternity. Our mortal bodies grow old and die whether we are good or evil, but our eternal life depends on what we do with our earthly life. The seed of eternal life is sown in us through Baptism. We can nurture it and water it with the grace of a holy life, or we can neglect it and focus so much on pleasing a dying earthly body that our eternal life is at risk. Our Lord wants our earthly life to flourish and blossom into something wonderful.

When Our Lord begins his public ministry the core of his message is that the Kingdom of God is at hand, and conversion and faith in the Gospel are needed. In today's Gospel, he gives us two parables to understand what the Kingdom of God is: the sowing and reaping of grain and the growth of a mustard seed. By teaching in parables, he is trying to explain deeper spiritual realities using the everyday realities understood by his listeners. The example of the grain shows us that this requires cultivation, waiting for the right time to reap the spiritual harvest of our labors, but also that God does the heavy lifting. The growth that is quiet, slow, and unseen, at times even when we're not doing anything, comes from him and his grace working in our souls and the souls of others.

The example of the mustard seed shows that it starts small: in Jesus' earthly ministry it went from him to twelve disciples, then to thousands by the time narrated in the Acts of the Apostles, and to the whole world and throughout history. The Kingdom doesn't just represent something small that has an incredible capacity for growth and expansion; like the cool shade of the mustard plant, it makes room for everyone to find rest and consolation because God wants everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth, for the truth will set us free.

**11th Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario Año B**

Queridos amigos, les comparto esta reflexión extraída de las fuentes de ePriest.com.

Las lecturas de hoy nos recuerdan que el Reino de Dios ya fue sembrado por Nuestro Señor y sigue creciendo con nosotros o sin nosotros, porque crece por el poder de Dios, como lo hace la naturaleza. También puede crecer en nosotros y a través de nosotros si lo cultivamos en nuestro corazón.

En la primera lectura de hoy, Ezequiel describe al Mesías como un brote tierno arrancado del árbol principal-- el linaje real de David. El Mesías se establecerá en las alturas, pero también crecerá y será un refugio para todos aquellos que puedan alcanzar esas alturas. Otros reyes y sus linajes verán la prosperidad del Mesías y se darán cuenta de que es el Señor quien los bendice o deja que su linaje se desvanezca, infructuoso. Muchos “pájaros” encontrarán refugio en este árbol, pero deben volar muy alto.

En la segunda lectura de hoy, Pablo nos recuerda que la forma en que usemos este cuerpo mortal moribundo determinará en qué se convertirá en la eternidad. Nuestros cuerpos mortales envejecen y mueren, seamos buenos o malos, pero nuestra vida eterna depende de lo que hagamos con nuestra vida terrenal. La semilla de la vida eterna se siembra en nosotros a través del bautismo. Podemos nutrirlo y regarlo con la gracia de una vida santa, o podemos descuidarlo y enfocarnos tanto en complacer a un cuerpo terrenal moribundo que nuestra vida eterna está en riesgo. Nuestro Señor quiere que nuestra vida terrenal florezca y se convierta en algo maravilloso.

Cuando Nuestro Señor comienza su ministerio público, el núcleo de su mensaje es que el Reino de Dios está cerca, y se necesitan conversión y fe en el Evangelio. En el evangelio de hoy, nos da dos parábolas para entender qué es el Reino de Dios: la siembra y la cosecha del grano y el crecimiento de una semilla de mostaza. Al enseñar en parábolas, está tratando de explicar realidades espirituales más profundas utilizando las realidades cotidianas entendidas por sus oyentes. El ejemplo del grano nos muestra que esto requiere cultivo, esperando el momento adecuado para cosechar la cosecha espiritual de nuestro trabajo, pero también que Dios hace el trabajo pesado. El crecimiento que es silencioso, lento e invisible, a veces incluso cuando no estamos haciendo nada, proviene de él y de su gracia que obra en nuestras almas y en las almas de los demás.

El ejemplo de la semilla de mostaza muestra que comienza pequeño: en el ministerio terrenal de Jesús pasó de él a doce discípulos, luego a miles en el tiempo narrado en los Hechos de los Apóstoles, y al mundo entero y a lo largo de la historia. El Reino no solo representa algo pequeño que tiene una increíble capacidad de crecimiento y expansión; como la sombra fresca de la planta de mostaza, deja lugar para que todos encuentren descanso y consuelo porque Dios quiere que todos se salven y lleguen al conocimiento de la verdad, porque la verdad nos hará libres.

We are now in “Ordinary Time” on the Church Calendar

Why Is Ordinary Time Called Ordinary?

Ordinary Time is called "ordinary" not because it is common but simply because the weeks of Ordinary Time are numbered. The Latin word *ordinalis*, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word *ordo*, from which we get the English word *order*. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time, in fact, represent the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ.

It's appropriate, therefore, that the Gospel for the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time (which is actually the first Sunday celebrated in Ordinary Time) always features either John the Baptist's acknowledgment of Christ as the Lamb of God or Christ's first miracle—the transformation of water into wine at the wedding at Cana.

Thus for Catholics, Ordinary Time is the part of the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. There's nothing "ordinary" about that!

Why Is Green the Color of Ordinary Time?

Likewise, the normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time—for those days when there is no special feast—is green. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the time after Pentecost, the period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.

When Is Ordinary Time?

Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of [Advent](#), [Christmas](#), [Lent](#), and [Easter](#). Ordinary Time thus encompasses two different periods in the Church's calendar, since the Christmas season immediately follows Advent, and the Easter season immediately follows Lent.

The Church year begins with Advent, followed immediately by the Christmas season. Ordinary Time begins on the Monday after the first Sunday after January 6, the traditional date of the Feast of the [Epiphany](#) and the end of the liturgical season of Christmas. This first period of Ordinary Time runs until [Ash Wednesday](#) when the liturgical season of Lent begins. Both Lent and the Easter season fall outside of Ordinary Time, which resumes again on the Monday after [Pentecost Sunday](#), the end of the Easter season. This second period of Ordinary Time runs until the [First Sunday of Advent](#) when the liturgical year begins again.

How Many Sundays Are There in Ordinary Time?

In any given year, there are either 33 or 34 Sundays in Ordinary Time. Because Easter is a moveable feast, and thus the Lent and Easter seasons "float" from year to year, the number of Sundays in each period of Ordinary Time vary from the other period as well as from year to year.


